## A VERY GALLANT GENTLEMAN by Danny Posner

A group of men and women met in Cambridge on March 26th to commemorate the centenary of the birth of a man they hold in high esteem. Nothing very unusual in that, perhaps, except that his one claim to fame is that he was a writer and editor of juvenile papers from Amalgamated Press in the first three decades of this century.

The man in question was John Nix Pentelow and his other, rather more dubious, claim to fame is that mention of his name today forty-one years after his death can still produce strong emotion and even anger in the hearts of some mature and intelligent men. For back in 1918 when Pentelow was Editor of The Magnet, he committed a cardinal sin as far as Magnet enthusiasts are concerned. He bumped off one of the leading characters and the felony was compounded by that fact that it wasn't one of his own characters but instead a Frank Richards creation, Courtaey, a sixth-former at Greyfriars School.

Frank Richards of course was a pen name for Charles Hamilton who created Greyfriars of Billy Bunter fame for Magnet, Tom Merry \& Co. of St. Jim's for The Gem and a host of other schooks and characters for other A.P. papers.

His name is now a legend among collectors of these papers. Collectively they are known as Hamiltonians and you'll find them in high places and low all over the world. It's from among a hard core of their members that mention of Pentelow as the slayer of Courtney produces harsher epithets than ever the boys of Greyfriars with their mild 'go and eat coke' or 'Beast' could bring themselves to say.
'The biggest bore in years', 'clever dick repartee', 'deadly dull dialogue', has beed said of his writing; some have gone even further, attacking the character of the man by suggesting that when editor he feathered his own nest by deliberately excluding Hamilton stories in favour of his own.

This last accusation hardly stands up to the facts available. Pentelow was a kindly man, according to former A.P. editors H. W. Twyman and C. R. Samways. Born in Somersham, a quiet Huntingdonshire village, in 1872 he was guickly off the mark into being published with stories appearing in Boys Jubilee Journal when he was only fifteen. By the turn of the century he was a regular contributor to A.P. boys papers under the pen name Jack North and his stories of Wycliffe and Haygarth schools are still popular with many collectors today. Outside his work for A.P. he contributed to The Captain and Chums, both highly popular magazines, and he made his mark also as a leading commentator on cricket. By the time he took over the editorial chairs of The Magnet and The Gem in 1916 he was relatively successful, well known in his own right, and a mature rather old looking 44.

He must also have been a worried man. The problem which faced him was that he had to produce each week two papers containing 15,000 word stories - AND BOTH STORIES WERE SUPPOSED TO COME FROM THE SAME MAN, NAMELY CHARLES HAMILTON. Hamilton was undoubtedly a writing machine. Words poured out from his typewriter of such consistently high standard that even today they can be read with pleasure where those of his contemporaries seem dated and relatively dull. Such was his output that he kept Magnet and Gem going for 32 years and managed to contribute to other A.P. papers as well. Orwell in his Essay on Boys Papers for Horizon concluded that the stories must have been written by a team of authors and was amazed when Hamilton turned up to confound him.

But even Hamilton couldn't keep it going non-stop for ever and sometimes the flow tumed into a trickle. To guard against the ultimate disaster of having nothing to print, A.P. decided to use substitute writers when necessary, all writing under the Hamilton byline appropriate to the porticular magazine.

By the early 1900's he was a frequent contributor to Harmsworth papers under several names most notably that of Jack North. He is best remembered during this period for his stories of Wycliffe and Haygarth schools which were subsequently reprinted in Boys Friend Library.

In 1916 however, there was a war on and most of the substitutes were doing their bit in France. At this time and for the next couple of years Hamilton was particularly unproductive so poor old Pentelow was left with a pretty ghastly situation to tackle. He resolved it in the only way open to him. He wrote the stories himself. But whereas other substirute writers had usually tried to write like Hamilton, Pentelow disdained such an approach and taking the Greyfriars and St. Jim's characters he wrote them up a la Pentelow. Years after his death this 'presumptuous' and 'arrogant' act was to bring contumely on his bones.

The killing of Courtney was a bit unfortunate. Pentelow, it has to be admitted, was a fine writer of the Victorian school where a bit of tear jerking and redemption through death went down rather well. So every now and again when he got the urge, one of his characters died a noble death and with a bit of imagination you could visualise the Angels, little Nell and Tiny Tim singing overhead. Hamilton was of different stuff and usually the only bloodletting was via the nose when, for instance Wharton and Vernon Smith, the bounder of Greyfriars, had a ding dong.

According to Bill Lofts, gumshoe par excellence in the search for facts of interest to collectors, Pentelow may have received orders from above in 1918 to kill off Courtney. Apparently the name was too much like that of another character in a companion paper and readers were getting confused.

Orders to kill, of course, mean all things to all people. For SMERSH its a device which explodes as you raise the lavatory seat; Hamilton would do it painlessly by despatching his character to join a rich uncle in South America. Pentelow took the higher ups literally and Courtney went to his end saving the life of a fellow pupil. The story was called 'A Very Gallant Gentleman: He was probably wrong to do it. Jack Overhill of Cambridge recalls that by 1918 the battlefront was the prospect of youth, with death at short odds. By contrast The Magnet was a thing of life and laughter until Pentelow's story made it for him as a fourteen year old youth 'a grim place where boys went in healthy and happy and came out in coffins':

Other boys however had different reactions and there is no doubt that long afterwards readers were writing in to say how much they had enjoyed the story.

When war was over Pentelow was made editor of The Boys Realm and he did a good job, contributing many fine stories himself under the pen name Richard Randolph. He was editor of other A.P. papers too and with his cricket writing and a young wife, life in Carshalton where he lived must have been good.

Two distinctions were to come his way. The first was in 1927 when Sir John Squire, who was doing book crits. for The Observer, picked up a copy of The Boys Friend Library at a bookstall on Godalming Station and spent his train journey into London reading 'Good Enough For England', a Pentelow story. Squire wrote a 1500 word review and even though he treated it tongue in check it was still the first time that a serious reviewer had looked at a boys periodical. Pentelow made the national press again in 1931 when he died, for The Times did a brief obit.

His wife, who was 28 years his junior, still lives but, as Deryck Harvey feature writer for the Cambridge Evening News has noted, all his friends and family are dead or scattered and nobody in the village where he was born remembers him. He lives on only through his work, remembered by those enthusiasts who find the old papers fascinating as nostalgia, or social commentary, or as some do, fine pleces of writing.

Pentelow would have enjoyed the centenary celebration. He was a santimental man who was reputed to pay for stories even when they lacked merit simply because the author needed the money. His contemporaries have described him as courteons and there are many today who owe their start to him. He wrote thousands of stories, was a good editor, and a popular man. It's isonic that one story called 'A Very Gallant Gentleman' should have marked him out for posterity.

# THE WYCLIFFE SAGA <br> BY W.J.A. HUBBARD <br> $4+\pi+*$ 

I should imagine that there have been few authors of boys' stories who have provoked move criticikm than Mr. John Nix Pantelow and quite a number of copies of both the "Collectors' Digest" and the "Story Paper Collectar" over the past twenty years have contained articles of this nature. Admittedly these articles hawe been mainly aimed at Pentelow in his capacity ws a "Substitute" writer to Mr. Charles Hamilton in the "Magnet" and "Gem" mainly during Pentelow's occupation of the editorial chair of both papers during the period 1916/19. They havg however, rather tended to obscure the fact that Pentelow was a fim writer in his own sphere and quite cspable of producing a school story of a very high standard to satisfy all but the most exacting critic.

I do not, however, in this articie, intend to piss any further remarks an Pentelow's "substitute" work in the "Magner" and "Gem" but to confine rmysolf to a description of some rather remarkable stories written by him under one of his numerous pen-agmes - Jack North. These stories were of Wyel iffe School and had Pentelow written nothing else during his long carser as a boys' sditor and author, I think they would have been sufficiont to astablish him as a writer of more than ordinary interest and power.

The Wycliffe stories originally appeared in "Pluck" some time towards the end of 1907 and according to my intormation were numbered as follows:-

No,117, Title not known; No.122, Jack's Enemy; No.126, Titie not known; No.128, Facing the Music: No. 131, Prafects of Bowker's House; No.134, At Half-Past the Elerenth Hour; No. 136 Big Billy's Transformation; No.140, The Shooting Box in Borden Wood: No.142. Brothers of Borden; No.144, The Mystery of Sparts Day: No.148. Cock. House at Wyeliffe: No.148, Sixteen of Tham; No.151, The Hitrities; No. 153, The Captain ofMyeliffe; No.157, Rival Captains; No,161, The Scamp of Wyeliffe; No. 166, The Commander's Birthday; No.169, The Secret Seven; No.172, In Open Rebellion; No.178, The Schemer; No. 181, Wyeliffe's Ghosts: No.186, Merry Minar's Chum.

There were also a number of Boys' Friand Libsaries (3d.) that were original stories that firtad into the main pattern of the yarns. These were:-

Then, in 1921, the "Pluck" stories were reprinted in the B.F.L. (4d.) 1st Series and for the benefit of the Collector who is interested in such details ! give below the order in which I consider the yams should be read. whough I would stress there is some dispute among followers of Pentelow's storias about this.

No.532, Jeck Jeckson's Enemy; No. 535 , The Rise of Bowker's House; No.539, The Prefects of Bowker's House; No.542, The Staunchest of Chums; No.547, The Wyoliffe Scholarghip Boy; No.550, The Brothers of Borden; No.555, Birds of a Feather; No.558, The Rivat Captains; No.588, Prefect and Fog; No.593, In Open Rebellion; No.598, A Troubled Term; No.53, Chums of Wycliffe; No.73, Larry and Co;No.82, The Runaway; No.604, Alexander the Grest.

As potrayed by Jock North, Wycliffe School was apparently situated somewhere in the South of England like the vast majonity of fictious schools. It had seven houses, all, with the exception of the School Houser named after masters, and had something like so0 pupils. The usual neighbouring town was Wiekham, the county town of Wickshire on the river Whern and some five miles from the school and spoken of by Jack m" "a big place, with considerable manufactures, though by no means to be classed as a manufacturing town purely and simple." The School colcurs were Green and Silver and there were also house colours.

An interesting and to my mind pleasing feature of the stories was the fact that the boys grew up and there
 was undoubsedly something rather fascinating in following their careers through the school to the dignity of the Sixth Form, It was this feature. that made the character work so important in the yarns and enabled the suthor to present such a realistic picture of school life, Let us then deal with all the laading actors of the Wycliffe stage.

First of all we have Jack Jackson and his chums, Donald MacDonald, David Davies and Patrick O'Hara who in the first story arrived as new boys and were placed in the Upper Fourth Form, They were portrayed as being about 15 yeers of age. Jackson, a fine example of a typical English boy and the sun of a famous explorer, was one of the four leading characters in the stories. A frank, hesithy though trifie ifresponsible boy with brillient all-round sporting ability he was a most interesting study, Donald MocDonald was is

Ityical Scots as Jacksan was Englist, dour, canny, with excellent mental powers he wes also ponsebsiad of considirable sporting abiliey leting a good cricteter and a first class foothaller, chiefly at right back and a fire
 aith abality an a fomale imparionator he was anot shown as a particulariy autstanding soontaman in the esely yaras but later improved grestly especially at Cricket where he became the 1 er XI wickat-kespsr, Davies was orobably the mogi lovable character in the whole of the Wycliffe Saga, Patrick O'Hara was a Fine spectmeniof the lrish race, full of fion and fight too when it was needed, and a good iportsman.

To these four boys there were alliad two orbers. Harry Marry was already at the school whan Jack Jackson and his churns arined. An Australian, with considerable powers of leadership, a great schoolbay alliround ericketar and a brilliant tider, the was also a member of the Upper Fourth. Later he was Cheirmen of the "Brothers of Borden", a schoolbov Club or Associstion formod by the laading characters in the stories and The schogt Crickat Canrain. Beiram Singhic, who also arrived $\approx$ a new boy in the ogening vam was a rial attompt to portray an Indian boy as an English Pofolic Schaol A Rajput Prince and a nephew of the greot picketer, Reniftingbit, he mas presented at a quieL intelligant boy 10 whom his friendt were devotect. It is hardly necessary to say that he was shoven in the yerms as a briliant batsman and wonderfut slip field. He also oussessed considerable hyponotic powers.


In opposition to Jackson and his friends in the opening yarns vere four other boys, Marris, Whicks, Porson and Saunders. Charles Horgoi Harris was a fine character indeed. Rather overbarimy and + bit of s bully in the early stones he fater reformed and became one of the putstanding boys in the school, A first class allround sportsman, Herris was shown as gider than the rest and in the Fifth Form.

Harris's triendihip with his thrse Upper Fourth churns was presented in s mast convincing manrer. His chivt friond, Resinale Robert Riddivestan Wicks wis shown $s s$ a lang-legged, English boy, with trpical curly hair and considerable sporting ability. Percival Porson, 3 rathes stout amistite boy and a steady and
thoroughly reliable chum and Arthur Siunders, a small clever bay, were the other two.
As the yams proceeded four boys from the School House sppeared on the scene. Bob Merritt, a scholarship bay raund whom the "Wycliffe Scholarship Bay" was mainly written and his three churs, Tom Blencewe. rather a bully of the Harris type at first, but later Bob's close friend, and Conway and Charles Cartwright, Reginald Hardy, of Morants House, the Cock House ar Wycliffe at the beginning of the series, was another close friend of Jack Jackson and Co., also Harry Crosswell.

It was these sixteen boys who tormed, at the suggestion of Bob Merritt, a Club within the School called the "Brothers of Bordan" whose meetings were held at a shooting box in Borden Wood, near the Schoul, then property of Squing Fottham; a local landowner who adopted Bob as hit son. Later on membership of the "Brothers" was extended to most of the Prelects and other leading characters and to be a "Brother" became a distinction that was prized among sil Wycliffe bays.

Jack Noeth used a very large number of charactens in the Weclitte yarns. There ware, perhaps, too many of tham, and the stage becama a infle crowided despite the foct that the boys grew up and left ensbling the author to gradually dispose of car tain of them in a plausible manner. In compilion this articlo, I have so far come acruss, including those just merely mentioned, over one hundred characters. He was, howener, extremely natural in dealing with the relations between the Senior and Junior boys of the School and the character of Waiter Raleigh, Captain of Wycliffe in the early yarns stands out mast prominently for this reasion. A wonderful ali-round sporisman and a boy loved and respected by both msstars and pupils Raleigh was, despite his perfections, one of the finest characters at Wycliffe and in some ways it was a great pity that Jack Noeth had to have him leave the School at the conclusian of "Birds of a Feather". William Rowsotn, who eventually succesded him as Captain was another interesting sudy, never loved as Raleigh was perhaps, because his character was too cold, but revpected for his attention to duty. A first elass sportsman, Rawson figured very prominently in the stories which Jack North wrote in the middle of the Wvelifte series featuring the dispute in the School ower the Captainey after Rallejgh's departure.

Pentelow was only 15 when he began writing for D'acre Clarke's Boys Jubilee Journal in 1887.
D'acre Clarke was a singularly unsuccessful publisher and his papers were all short-lived. Evidently be didn't check his contributors carefully enough because in the year when J.N.P. was first published, Boys Jubilee Journal twice had to apologise for publishing plagiarised stories.
Pentelow's contributions were not particularly good but they at least had the merit of being his own work.


I have already spoken of Bowker', atherwards Williams' as the house at which the leading characters resided, although later Harris and his chums transferred to Whiteman's House about half way through the series. The Captain of Bowkers' at the beginning of the stories was George Barham. Transferred to Bowkers' from another house in an effort by the Headmaster, Dr. Anderson, to rescue the House from the state of decline In which it had fallen, Berham succeeded in a not inoonsiderable task in which he found opposition, not only from the "bad hats" of the house but from the Housemaster as well. A quiet, modest and clever Senior, but a boy of comsiderable datermination and a good sportsman, Barham was halped in every way by Jack Jackson and his chums and had the satisfaction, before he left, of seeing his house "cock" of the School. Other prominent Seniors were Algemon Carver, one of the "bad hats" who, like Harris, was in the Fifth Form in the early yarns, Snow, an opponent of Harris at the beginning but later a good all-round sportamin who sucteeded Barham as House Captain and Victor Laringa, a boy of mixped blood who was a charactsr of the worst type.

Wilfred Duncan, another fine type of Senior was the original Captain of Gazman's House while Paddison, an excallent all-round sportiman who eventually captained both the Sehool Cricket and Socoar thams sueceeded Raleigh as Captain of Morants,

Pawson was the original Captain of the School House while Arthur Warden was Head Prefect of Leighs'. Warden, not a bsd chap at heart, but rather inclined to be influenced by others was a prominent character in the stories written round the fight for the captaincy of ths School. Dalrymply, another Prefect and a close friend of Warden and Raphaet, a Jew, but a fine chap and eventually a Prefect and a "Brother of Borden" were other Senior boys who played parts in the stories.

As the stories developed, Whiteman's House played a more distingulshed part mainly beceuse of the transter of Harris and his friends. It was made clear by the author that Harris's transfer was at the requast of Mr. Whiteman, wiso had a-strong liking and respecr for him,

Another leading Whiteman's House Senior and one of the most splendid character in the Wyalifte Saga was Arthur Danperfield. Proud, headstrong and with grest powers of leadership Dangarfield later became the mainstay of the opposition to tha "Brothers of Borden" In the school, and his death, an action typical of Jack North, was in some ways a considerable loss to the stories as he left a gap that was never really filled. Dangerfield's best triend was Bulstrode, another Senior, who later became one of the "Orathers" after his chum's death.

One of the most determined opponents of the "Brothers" in the School was Wiriey a School House Senior whose enmity was a prominent feature in quite a number of the Wycliffe yarns. An associate, but never as triend of Dangerfield, Witley was a very interestimg character stucty. Butcher, known to his friends as "Siaughterhouse" and White, known as "Doggy" were two other Seniors who were Witley supporters,

A boy who played a leading role in the final story of the series was. Alexander. A senior from Eton and a fine cricketer who had already featured at Lords he returned to his old school at the end of the yarn which was, in my opinion, rather a pity bs the author might have made more of him.

Like all ficticious schools, Wyeliffe had more than its share of "bad hats". I have dewit with mast of the seniors and we must now consider those who were mainly in the Middle School when Jack Jackson and his chums arrived. Prominent among them was Augustus Thwaites, an arrant "Funk" who was known as "Spider" to his schoolmstes. Associated with Carver in an attampt to tring Harris and Wicks into disgrace by making it appear that they had cheated in an examination, Thwaites was eventually expelled from the Schoal. Two other "bod hats" wer the Solomon wits, Aaron and Moses, Jewish boys with all the worst attributes of their race. Then there were a number of Witley's mpporters, Butes, Spring, Gaod, Cornelius Dando and Mimmack. Neither Spring or Bates, who were dose chums, whet bod chaps at heart. Good was a thoroughly vicious charscter and one of the worst boys in the School which he was eventually asked to leave, Dando and Mimmack were merely hangers-on.

A boy of Harris's type, who his reformed and who dominates by sheer force of physical strength, character and will power always socceeds in making enemies among other bays who in the ordinary run of events would not take exception to him, and Baird, Webter and Wilderspin figured among the oppanents of the "Brothers" mainly for this reston, Baird, indead,
 kept up his dislike to the very end of the series as in the final story, along with Bond, Canton, Powell and Pogers of Rasy's House, he helped in the formation af the "Macedonians" the Association star ted by Alexander in rivaliry to the "Brothers of Borden",

One of the leading characters in "Chums of Whelliffe" was Ram Ghoah, an indian boy. Actually he was reslly Bhedwar Singh, Beirem Singhji's cousin and mainly for that reason a deadly enemy of the "Brathers" who playsd a prominent part in tolting his ovit plems.

In the early Wycliffe stories, the Junior boys were only mentioned oceasionally and played rather omemental perts. Durward, who was originally Rowson's fag. Sinider and Simpson were the most prominent of these characters but with the apotarance of Larty Merry. Herry Merry's brother on the scene in B.F.L. No. 588 "Prefect and Fasi", the limelight was switchod to some extant on the boys in the lowar forms. Larry Merry was one of the best of Jack North's creations, an irresponsible boy with grest charm and powers of leadership. Larry's chief chums were Durward and Ewbald fram the School House; Simpson, who owed allegiance like Lary to Williame; Frank Fishor and Tommy Tidd, from Whitemans' and Wood Minor from Moranth. The explaits of these juniors, who were known to themselves as the "Secret Seven" were featured in quite a number of the yarns.

Tommy Tidd, the son of a local greengrocer who was killed in Jeck duckson's father's employment, war the most interesting of Larry's friends. He was, however, not a Cockney character, but a perfectly normal bey in habits, monner and speech, a most refreshing change to the usual procedure. Ewbald, a boy with no less them six. Christian names and so for obvious reasona known to his-triends as "Bill" was anothar good charecter. He was s cousin of Arthur Dangerfield. The suthor's presentation of these seven junior boys was of a high standard for all the lads seemad to anjoy a most distinct separato personality.

In the later yarns other Junior boys came on the scene and of these the mast prominent was Claude Arthut Coningsby Wider. A boy who had been brought up in India, Wilder found himself at loggerheads with the other junions right from the start.

Angther leiding Junior utse came on the scane Later was William Armbrose Hamilton (隹uil) Berrance, Burly and aggressive, and in many ways rather like Harris, Barranoe figured not only as an enemy of Wilder but as a rival of Larry and his chums.

Larry's popelarity at Wycliffe aarned him quise a few arremies as well as friandly rivals and among thase we must include Dark and Henry Mighell Golding. Dark's nature was like his name and his dislike of Larry and his chums was prosented in a wery raalistic manner in the storias. He quickly realisad that Larry and Barrancer were marked out as natural rivals and did all he could to make trouble betwsen them and succeeded far a time. Golding was an overgrown lout of a boy whose lack of brain power kept him in the Junior School. He was considerably under Dark's intluence and an assaciate of older boys whone comparyy the should have avoided.

The Hosdmaster of Wlycliffe at the boginning was Dr. Anderson, A stern but firm and just man in the tradition of Messes, Locke and Holmes of "Magnet" and "Gem" fame, and likad and respected by the whole School, Dr. Anderson retired from the stories to become the Bishop of Culverbourne:

There were no less than eight Housemasters - Messrs. Bowker, Dunford, Gazman, Leigh, Morant, Ray, Whiteman and Williams. Mr. Bowkor, an M.A. and also Master of the Sixth Form was a scoundrol with a weak. nature and vicious temper who was killedin the early stories. Mr. Dunford was also Master of the Upper Third, Mr, Riehard Timpthy Gazman, M,A., was one of the mest important actult charactars. Knowen to the whale Schaol as "The Gasman" and a fussy interferring man with a conaiderable sense of his awn importance he was a very fine charicter study. Master also of the Upper Fourth he succosded Dr. Anderson as Headmaster. Mr. Leigh, in rather ahatent-minded individual, sueceeded Mr. Gacmm as Master of the Upper Fourth.

Mr. Morant was probably tha bsst likad Master at Wyclitfe and a most brilliant spoersman while Mr. Ray succeeded Mr. Gazman as Housemaster. Mr. Whiteman eventually took Mr, Gazman's place as Headmaster of Wheliffe in the firut varns. A good sportsman who took a personal intorest in many of his hove, his popur lesity was almont as areat as that of Mr, Morant.

Mr. Benjamin Inchbald Williams was another interesting character study. Known to his boys as "Big Billy" he succeeded Mr, Bowker as Housemaster and played a promivent part in quite a number of the yarris, Another Master who played a leading port was Mr. Malcolm Kagham Waters, the funi or Solence Master, A rather despicable type whio did not hesitate to actually spy on the boys, Mr. Waters was disliked both by them and fis colsoagues.

Two other Masters mentioned were Mr. Lymbery, the Seniar Science Master and the Revd. Theodare Wiliare, known to the boys for obvious reasons as "Little Billy"

Other adult characters I must reluctantly leave out owing to considerations of space.

# PENTELOW'S OTHER SCHOOLS

With all the prodigous amount of material that Charies Hamitoo himself rumed out week by week, added to by the very considerably proportion published by his imitators, we find ourselves today with a fairly large market of these sort of school storits. Though the themes varied, they had to, on the whole the pattern followed each other. The age of the schoolboy claracters never varied from the set slandard of fourteen to sixteen years, never was it anything but Middle School. This never varied week by weck, year after year. Also for some unknown reason it had to be a public school. One author did write cone of two really refreshing series of school stories about the boys and girls of an ordinary county council schooL. We had schools on ships, a school in the Rocky Mountains of Cimada, one in the Wild West; interesting variations no doubt bat these had to have the inevitable fat boy, the scapegoat who reformed and the other too familiar types, Quite a change, but these schools did not last long. One famous author merged his very popular detactive tales with school yarns and this idea became very popular and proved themself by lasting for mary years. But even this was the usual pattern of Fourth foomers, Remowitas, fat boys, reformed bad lids, dandified freaks and all the too familiar appliances.

How nice it was, with all this surfeit of similarity to suddenly happen on to a school story which was different, where the boys grew up in a natural way, where the masters were homan beings and not just cy pes; schools set in beautiful sarroandings. Fags, middle school and sentions all doing the things you would expect them to do plus, of course, that little bit extm needed by the author to make up his story. You associate a yam of that sort, one which is jolly interesting, full of adventure but not far-fetchod, with such writers as Talbot Baines Reed, Desmond Cake, Fleteher and Rhodes and yoa are sure to think first of all of the forunner of them all, "Tom Brown's Schootday $\mathrm{s}^{\prime \prime}$. Stories rich with humour, schoolboy pranks, the sins and sorrows of the average boy, in some cases pathos but mustly all full of sport and adventure. Nothing too far-fetched in these yarns,
jast enough of that little bit of extra to make a good plot, Sach stories were those written by that very versatile author John Nix Pentelow, Versatility was John Nix Pentelow's main asset. He could write a good adventure story, pirates, scouting, detective yarms, tales of Robin Hood and the Widd West, fonter and cricket tales; well anything you liked. But I think be expelled with his school stories. One can fault him that he introduced too much sadness, he was wont to "Kill" off a central charactet. Perhaps for this reason it has been argued that his tales were for the more sdule youngster, that idea may be helped in that he introduced a love interest most times. Nothing overdone bat a trifle more than the merage boy and girl friendstip. I feel myself that he too could be criticised for bringing in too mach fighting Unsuipassed, however, were his descriptions of the cricket matches the foothall gumes, the boat races and the athletic events which took place at these schools of his. All true to life and nothing left to the imagination. He made much of team spirit did Pentelow as he did the love of "Alma Mater". School against school, school agzinst neighbouring villages, houses against house, dormitory against dormitory: these last for a cup or shield put up for competition. The "House Cup" or "Dormitory Cup" was a favourite thome of his and he was practically alone amongst authors for this. This broaght in boys of different ages, from fags to prefects all taking part in the same team. Often ind this is umusual too, we had the hoys playing against the masters. Yes, Pentelow used his knowledge of sport to good purpose in his various school yams. And, let it be said, he knew his subject be it cricket, footer, boxing or athletics, Who better than he for instance was qualified to talk of cricket or rather write of cricket.

But on to his schoots and schoolboys. I have written elsewhere of his Iwo most famoses schools - Haygarth and Wycliffe. So now lets have a look at some of his other schools.

## WELSTEAD

This was a school which through the slackness of its headmaster had gone down. A school with ancient traditions and which had produced geat men but unlike Haygarth was unlucky in having a weak type of man as Head. The story tells us of the arrival at Welstead of Paul Delaware. Now Pentelow went one better than any of his rival authors in this yam. These other writers bring into their stories boys from owerseas, of different colours, different races. Pentelow himself as a substitute foc one of them introduced quite a few Colonials and such. But this time - I do not recollect a similat happening, he brought in a Red Indian boy. Well anyway he washalf Indian - if his father was an English emigrant his mother was an Iroquois prinotss. Paul Delaware was a Delaware though we are subsequently told that his father was rightly named Ware and for obvious reasons adopted the name of Delaware. We tead of this boy of fifteen who looked mach alder being pitchforked - strange thing this for a school story - inta the Sixth Form.

His first friend was an old pugilist turned cabdriver "Honest Chawlicy" Arbor who taught him how to use his fists in the approved English manner and how well it helped him in his struggle segainst the morst set at Welstead. His pluck and steadfastnest won for him the friendship of that strange but sterling charncter George Erasmas Baythome, be of the terrible fists and the sarcestic tongua. A friend hard to win bat be won, who never failed him. Ninta James, daughter of the Headmaster soon became his friend (perhaps more later) and so did that misubderstood man Mr. Moas the second master. In time others rallied to Delaware's side, he became Captain of Welstead and helped to revive the footer team, made Welstead a great cricketing sthool once again.

The plot of the story is how his main enemy James Chivers is secretly his cousin and a contender for the favour and fortsine of their grandfather, old General Ware. The plottings of Chivers and his henchuman Leah - what an utter rotter this last one was - and the friendship of Baythorne and Nima are interposed with the winning of some who sided with Chivers at the start - principally Lowdell and Stanhope, who died in the end. Thls yam of Welstead, a great public school isear Ancester in the South of England and ane of the more serious writings of Pentelow, it is not conspicuous for its light moments, goes on to tell us how old General Ware found his long-lost grandson; how the Headmaster was saved from fintancial ruin by Paul and his friends: how in the end Chivers repented and found his true level. Yes, 1 more setrious tale than usual but realistic in everyday. Perhaps the best part of the entire Welstead saga is the celebration (at Wycliffe) after the historic match with that famous school. The scene in the great Hall of Wycliffe. Well perhaps we could not do better than give it in Pentelow's own words -
"Meanwhile in the dinting-fall at the School House, hot tea ran doan thirsty throats, and the Wycliffe: fellows vied with one another in keeping the plates of thetr visitors replenished.

There was not much time to spare, but it was impossible to leave without somse acknowiedgement of the hospitality they had received. Morton said that speechifying wass't in his line: Lowdell grunted when asked to get up and speak: Paul suggested that Baythorne could do it better than he and so, as everyone had expected from the first, is was Baythome who rose. A moment before talk had beter going on all around. Now silence fell.

Baythorne's clear well modulated voice broke it. He made no attempt at eloquence; but his words were hearty and to the point.
"Gentlemen of Wycliffe" he said "ny commades and I feel that we can't leave without some expression of the pleasure that this visit has given us all. We were toyally welconsed, we have been royally entertained and - we haven't been beaten. I ought not perhups to set the last fact alongside the other two because I am quite sure that a part of the hospitality intended for us was a good thrasting. This is not a time for toasts bot if it were I should drink to Wriclifle, coupling with
the toascs the names of Wycliffe's honoured Head, of Mr. Harris, captain of the school and of Mr. Merry, captain of the footer eleven."
He sat down amid the applause of his comrades. Then Mr. Whiteman the Head of Wycliffe spoke a few genial words saying he was glad to have witnessed the inauguration of matches between the two schools and that they would long continue. After Merry major had said it few words everybody looked at Harris.
He rose, squared his great shoulders and spoke. "Merry major says he's no orator. I don't know. Put him alongside me an' 1 goess he's a regulat Semostherses. But its up to me to say a few words and I suppose l've go to. So here goes. Jolly good fellows, jolly good game, folly good result - though there's another I'd have liked better. Here's the best of good fortune to Welstead and to Delaware, her captain".
That let Paul in,
"There isn't much for me to ssy - after Bay thome. But I heartily endorse all he his said and I should like to add, on my umo behalf, that I shall never forget my first visit to Wycliffe. A year ago I had never set foot on English sed and I suppose no one would hive called me anything bat an American. But my father was English and 1 have liked to think myself 50, and Welstend has made me an Englishman asWycliffe mould have done if it had boen my good fortune to have come here. For that's the great thing aboat our public schools - 30 my father told ms - they make Englishmen. Eton or Harrow, Marlbotough or Malvern, Wycliffe or Welstead they all have that at least in common they make Englishmen".
Thoy cheered him to the echo, Wyeliffe and Welstead alike joining in the din. Harris came round to pat him on the back, Lowdell growled with pleasare. Baytharme said "Well done, Paul".
But perhaps it was to Morton that the words went home most for when Welstead was at its worst Morton had always kept alive a spark of the public spirit.

These were Pentelow's words and give some illustration of his idea of a public school. That ends for now the story of Paul Delaware and Welstead School. A pity for we should have lile to have heard more of Welstead and how it maintained its place alongside the other great public schools which Delaware quored in his speech, after the historic match at Wycliffe.

## FRANKLINGHAM

John Nix Pentelow as Jack North wrote in scme lengeth of Wycliffe, Haygath and Welstead, but it was under the pen name of Richard Randolph that he wrote more well known yarrs of two other schools, Franklingtam and Thirlestane. The tale of Johnny Goggs at Franklingham School is a direet contrast to the more serious epic of Welstead. Piere you have an abundance of lighthearted schoolboy fun and as they say, never a dull moment. The school of Franklingham is one and a lalf miles from the villige of that mame. On the map you will find it very near the towns of Earlisham and Howlisham. There are five houses at Franklingham., Grayston's, Hayters, Waymarks, Bultritrades and the Head's Howse. To Grayston's went Johnny Goggs on his
artival at Franklingham. John Goges was a boy of fifteen with unusual gifts and certainly far from the usual in looks. To say he was freakish looking would not be at all exageerating but behind those big spectacles of his were in the words of his creator "the bluest eyes any boy ever had"- And certainly an intellect far in advance of his years. Yes, Johmy was an inveterate "spoofer". "Spoof" was a favournite diversion of schoolboys of his day and age, They nicknamed him "Goqgles". Let it stand that his comical mame suggested that those big glasses of his were no small part of his "spoof". Eyes as keen and observant as his did not need any aid. Lanky and thin in appearance, his frame too belied the कiry sfrength and aglity he displayed on the sports field and ruming track. "Spoov", yes he spoofed them all along the line. He talked like a college professor: people woadered when meeting lum first if he was quite normal. His conduct seemed to be on a pattern set by his "dear grandmother. That "dear old lady" popped up all the while. Just more of his "spoof". "She" was in reality a very prominent private detective and certainly not old or ladylike come to that. On the day Goges artived at Franklingham many strange events occurred. Animals appeared to talk, people said things (or a ppeare if to say) which caused much diversion and all the time it was Goges who was a wery clever ventriloquist.

Franklingham was reached by the Southern railway and ir was at the railway station and on the journey from there to the school that the first funny eptsodes occurred. Amongst others it was here that Goggs first met lis chums to be, those widely different characters, the three from Grayson's House, Blount, Tricketts and Waters. Nicknames are characteristic of schoolboyss and this school of Franklingham was a bit more than fond of using nicknames. These thice had theirs, "Blagshaw", "Tricks" and "WugtaiI". Through the fiest story of Johnny Goggs runs the theme of the emnity of Cardenden for his cousin the scheol Captain, Harry Granville. How Guggs got mixed up in all this, how his "grandmother" was able to prove that this Cardenden mas a "bad egg", this was the serious gatt of the yam. But amoegs all this, the drama and the amasing antics of Gogess we are treated to reatistic football matches, not where one form plays another only but where one house apairst another, when the teams conlain seniors and junioss. Goges tarns out ou be a first rate centreforward, not what you would expect from his looks but anyway good enough for Graysons House.

The spors day at Franklinglam was a great occasiun a part from the ablilerit events and the nuthor of these series of stories of Johnny Goges gove us many different kinds of erents, more than you get by und lage from the ustal schood story, most of the dramatic incidents happened. On this especial day Jolunny's "dear grandmother" cane along with all the sether gazrdians, parents, mothers and fathers with the usual complement, of pretty sisters to bring in a little of feminine interost. You have everything in this yam of Johnny Goges and Franklingham School. Spurt. schoolboy fur, intrigue and plotting and quite a different sort of detective work from the usual. Yes, quite a bit different from the usual schoot story. Again as in
"Jack North's" yarns you hame masters whio are more than just masters, men of wide understanding and who are not adverse to furting out in a match against their pupils. You have a school captain who is not zutomatically caption of football. You have form prefects to each house and in some cases not even Sixth Formers. You resd of a "Ganses Secretary". Quite a change that. Prefects meetings when the only purishment to call corporal punishment, is meted out. In fact the "cane" is hardly mentioned in this unique yarn. Everything else is there, everything needed to make a school tale which soursds normal and life like. Johnay Goges is a fine type of English sehoolboy apart from his apparent eccentric ways and urusual looks. Anyway who wants the heroes always one of the curly haired "landsome" type, shining examples of virtue bat apt to go off the other way in their bad moments. "The Fourth Form at Franklingham' with Johnny Goges in the keading role was oae of Riehard Randolph's finest school yams and it had a sequel "Goges Grammsrian". In this Johnny Goggs transferred himself to Rylcombe Grammar School. Oid favoarites in Gordon Gay, the Two Wootton brothers, Frank Monk and Carboy, not to mention the French boy Mont Blanc, all came into this fine yarn. All the characteristies of Goggs were given full went in this worthy sequel to the Franklingham yarn and more was tevealed of the fine grammar school and its immates, once the feature of a very old boys magzzine now almost forgotten. The same author was not fesponsible foe these early Rylcambe staries but the creator of Goges knew all about it is the story "Goggs Grammarian" proves.

Johnny Goggs of Franklingham school - if his creator had lived long enough we might have read more about him. As an afterthought, one remarkable thing about this main Franklingham yarn and I fancy I am right in saying the others I hive mentioned also is that there is not a funny fat boy in the story at all.

## THIRLESTANE

Versatility was John Nix Pentelow's strong point and the stories let wrote under the pen name of "Richard Randolph" were examples of that versatility. Stories of film stars are not very often dove-tailed in with thase of schoolboys but in his Famous "Ferrars of the Sixth" Richard Randolph wove a very intricate patterin of a Sixth Form boy who became a film star while still at school. The school was Thirlestane. Like Welstead and Haygarth, Thirlestane was wry pear Wycliffe and alnosst as well known as a mursery of famous politicians, great soldiers and even greater athketes. Johan Alston Ferrars was a name which will be eves on the "Roll of Honour" at Thirlestane School. Great film star and even greater cricketer - Ferrars of Worcestershire and England - great batsman and even greater fast bowite - the reconds mill show how many times he tarned out for England. Not so well known as a foorballer though Ac was the Corinthian centreforward after his school days were oner. The story of Jack Ferrars and his struggle against Weldon Barcherd and his set at Thirlestane brings in the ussual intrigue we expect from Pentelow. How Ferrars' father was ruined by Burcherd's rascally half brother lasper

Walkreth and cummitted suleide. How Fetrars to help support himeelf at Thirlestane took on film work. Great characters like Charles Crocker Houlston; "Colorado Clarley" the Cowboy; John Gor: don; William Warke were only a few we meet in the members of this film company Ferrass worked with. The usual "Black shoep" we can expect to find in any great organization like this film coenpasy worked against our hero, worked in harness with his enemies at the school. The stocy tells of how Ferrars came aut un top in the end though many were the near escapes he had to death and ntination. We have our fill of ericket, football, boxing, athletics plenty of school boy fiun and frolics. Penty of thrills and adiventures. As in his other yarns. Pentelow intruduces some fine examplets of schoolmasters; his schoolboys are the asuill lifelike sort we expect from him. Seniors and juntiors all mixing together, come sport come war. The feminine interest is a trifle mose than the "boy and ginl friendships" of tbe "Jack North" yarms. That is why I say this saga of Jack Ferrirs was more for tho adult reador then the very young. We find interest in the love affair of Jack Ferrats and Young Vers Gordon and are seddened somewhat by the un-returned love of "Colorado Charley" for Nina, Jack Ferrars' sister. Sentiment is more developed in this yarn than others and a certain pathos is brought in the death of Gawaine Grant-Smith. A fine character Grant-Smith. Agzinst Ferrars primarily but in the end he did Ferrars a good turn. In fact Juck had to thank him for a considerable tise in wealth in the later stapes. The deaths of Leeman and Leain were an inevitable port of the story 50 was the demise of Jasper Walkreth but Weldon Barcherd escapes and the story ends leaving us wondering if be will ever cross the path of Ferrars aglin. Well, he did as we read in another story of Richard Randolph's. To wit, the story of the 1921 Australia test visit to England - the adventures of "Young Yardley", Yardley was a Thirlestane boy but it is to be sajd that he was never mentioned in "Ferrars of the Sixth". Perhaps we shall tell of the remarkable experienees of Gilbert Yardiey another time. There is the stony of Jack Ferrars of Thirlestane school, we cannot find space for much to say about those other fine fellows - Brooke the school Captain (Ferrars aas only sports Captain): Patrick Flannigas, that sterling Irishman; the three inseparable chums of the Fourth - Jimmy Wynward, "Jammy Chivers" and Musgrave: Conrad Wales, true to his chum Grant-Smith to the very end. Just anothes schuol of Pentolow's and what a story, A story of lifeat school, a good glimpse into the ever interesting films, a srory bringlag in many outside characters apart from those at the school. The school held an enormous galaxy of human characters. The Head, the Reverend Philip Warrender - The thee Housemasiers, Pater, Weston and Kennarth; great mes in mute ways than one. The story of John Aiston Ferrars had every thing a great author could give it Its onty fault, like the others. it finished too soon.

## WINDLESTHORPE

In search of lost treasure. How often has that been the theme of an adventure yarnt. But mix it with school life, cricket and you have a decided
change from the usual rim of shool stones. Secret underground passages which open by wny ul hidden panels in a Lower Fith Form study. Iwo schoolboys on the quest of the monk's treasure. No wonder Gawior, the bully of the Upper Fifth wanted this particulat study in the Lower Fitth passige, It was quite a colncidence that Quentin Qainthed the other seeker after hidden wealth was allotted or mather claimed this room. Quinthred had been sent to Windlesthorpe School by the man who he thought was his father to frack down this treasure trove. So had Gawlor been sent by hir cousin on the same errand, but the difference lay in the fact that Quinthed hated the fob afrile anything undertand was just in Gawlar's line. The startling adventures and hairbreadth escapes which befell the hato of this talo of Windlesthorpe School in the mysteriour underground passage which had its other exit oft the moor near the school, are only a purt of the story. How he fought against the prejudices of his school mates who suspected him of foel play against the popular captain of Windlesthorpe The logalty of his particular chums "Hurricane" Gale never falters whatever the evidence against Quinthred. Firm friends of the 1wo are the other two inmates of thrir dormitory Bill Browil and Hollis-BrownL. Quinthred has friends outside the school and aseful friends they prove too. Caesar Jenkins the county crikketer; his servant John Williams; that queer Irishman Denis O'Hagan who knew where the treasure chamber wais. Well, no. one gets the treasure because it has been recovered years befone by no less chan the lord of the manior. In other words. Highbrow the captain of Windlesthorpe. That was the surprixe for as in the last clapter of this antisual school yam. "Ouinhhed's. Quest" by Harry Huntingdoe? Just another pennamse for John Nix Pentelow. You can guess from that we have our fill of crickel, plenty of "scrapping", some good pen portraits of masters and scholars. Mi. Flamink the house master was a different type from what we expect of a master but onse with a heart of gisld. Some of the boys too ate interesting studies and intriguing too are the nick namses they have. Schoolboys have a liking for nicknames and Pentelow makes good use of that liking. Windlesthorpe was a gratat public school; its colours of green, gold and siver had boen woen by many well-known personalities; it had produced many great athuetes and in Highbrow, Quinthred, Gale, Hollis-Brown and Brown Secondas to meation only a few had good materiat in her two Houses, Old and New as they were called, to keep up shat Iradition. Another great schoof and one more great yam by Penelow.

## HARDEN

"The Troubesomse Twins" by Jack North is doreribed as $\rightarrow$ "wery laughable school tale". It has its dramatic moments but generally this is one of the lightest of Penteloa's schuol yarns. The title gives sombe indication of the theme of the story. Iwins, that is identical rwits, and doubles hore been a popular standby for authors. The periodicals we are moet familiar with have fatured many instances of (wine and doubles, their subsequent complications have made many intrigsing stories. Maybe we could siy the dea has worn a trifle threadbare
and excuse could be found for Pentelow to try to do full justice to the theme now and again. Perhaps. he is best known for his effort in this direction which we know as the "Twins from Tasmania" by "Richard Randolph". A story of Highcliffe and Cliff House with a good slice of Greyfiliars to give good measare. Not dealing with that story as they were not Pentelow Schools, we pass on to Haygarth. Here many spicy plots were woven roand the likeness of Jimmy Markworth and Clinde Ferringe. You have to read the saga of Haygarth to appreciste all the implications of that likeness. They ware not telated which made the similarity in features so remarkable. Haygarth School has been dealt with so on to another great pablic school of Pentelow's - Harden. Maybe riot so well-known as some of the others but still a top ranker as public schools go. Indeed, its Headmaster, Dr. Marston was without a peer. Maybe only Dr. Anderson of Wycliffe and the Rev. Arthur Dalton of Haygarth were his eqaats.

The school was situated in the village of Harden and very near to the towns of Devency. Ampleton and Wavenhoe. There were three Houses at Harden. Wrightsons, Lakes and Olivers, from which we get the names of "Wrong 'uns' - "Fish" and "Ironsides" by which epithets the varioas inmates of thesc houses styled themselves. Two prefects to each House was the rule at Harden and the competition was wey keen for the bonour, Coverdale was the school Captain and his fellow prefect in Wrightsons was Francis Mandrell. The enmity of Mandrell and Clowten, the rotter of the Harden Sixth is a featute of this yarn. Indeed this hatred was hereditary for their fathers ance very firm friends were at loggerheads and the story has its sad note at the finish when these two men died under dramatic cireumstances. Bill Barcoe was not a prefect but still a very good friend of Mandrell's and Coverdale's. Apart from these few seniors, the upper school of Hardon takes second place in the tale of the "Troublesome Twins", Jim and Joe Tefford are Lower Fourth boys and to say they were mischievous is an understatement.


Both great sportamen, they soon made themaelves felt and found kindred spirits in Featherstone, Fowle, Waller, Thempson, Kensy and Harrison minor. Much fon is caused by the number of times the twins are mistaken for one another. This also causes consterna tion of another kind. Anyway, you have to read the story to find out all that happens. But the "Troublesome Twins" by Jack North is a little bit different from most school yarns and I think that it is unique in the fact that the schoul has a secret society and as the qualification for memberthip is thit you must be a son or grandson of a former Harden boy, it is conclusive that it has its members in Lower, Middle and Senior School. The "Hereditaries" it was called and beld its meetings in Irae ceremonial costume and rites in the biggym. The captain of the school was of course, High Hereditary. Quite a nowel turn thls and thoagh it had its scrious note, mach fon also. Truly, a "wery laughable school yarn" this story of the twins who came to Harden from Davenhy Grammar School.

A VERY GALLANT GENTLEMAN<br>by Jack Overhill

I bought my first GEM - Tom Merry's War Furd - at Wode's, a little shop in Union Road. Cambridge, on a wet afterncon in November, 1914. it thrilled me. I then took it every woek and belore long the MAGNET.

I soon knew all the boys at Greyfriars and 5 Sc . Jim's. They came alive to me. Eleven years old, I was atways with them - and never happy when I wesn't.

The time came when I lost interest in school stories. I found more excitement in sales of adventure, highwaymen, outlows and pirates. But I continued taking the MAGNET and GEM, putting them unresd on two separate piles on the low cupboards beside the fireptace in Try shoempleer.father's workshop.

In January. 1918, just before my fifteenth birth. day, the illustrations in a Magnet called A. Very Gallant Gantleman, impelled the to road it. Courtney. a sixth-formser at Greytrigrs, had died fewing the lite of Valenos, slso a sixth-former, whose sister Violer, had been his close friend It was the last yeis of the 1914-18 war. Call-up at eighteen and eight months, the battlefront at nineteen, was the prospect of youth - dying in thousands. Mothers and wives running hysterically in the streets, fatal tolograms in their hands, wis a searing sight. I had always admired Courtney; he inspired affection; and though the circumstances of war had hardened my nsture, the stary shocked me.

Death had no place in the MAGNET. The atmosphere of Greyfriars had been light and airy. It had been a place of san and shade, of lise and tioughter: for though wrongs often had to be righted, things shaped themselves hapoily in the end. All that had chenged. Grevfriars had become like the public
schools of Victorian fiction - grim places whore boys went in healthy and happy and came out in cottins

Taless of that sort had never appealed to me: I wanted fun in the form room, fights in the gym, footboll and cricket matches, iapes, study freods, Uripe to the tuckshop. plonics in Friardale Woods, boys breaking bounds after lights put, mysterious goings-on in the old priory and the tower, and occasionat barringout, and holiday adventures at home and abroad. In short, I wanted the fullness of life, not the inevitability of death. For me, Greyfriars could never be the same apain, It had been transformed inta the raality of the living world - how could it be the same again.

Critica of subetitute stories of Greyfriars and St Jim's have often said that some of themshouldn't heve seen dsylight. The worst of tham had a better claim to publication than this one. It was folly on the part of the Amalgamated Press to print it. The story couldn't hove increased sales, onily decreased them,

I hoven't seen a copy of A Very Gallant Gentleman for fifty years, but two items in it have personal significance.
I can still see Courtney and VI Valenco draw apart when I hear the ring of a bicycle bell - an incident in the story.

Springtime of Youth is a title of one of the chapters.

So it is in my first novel, ROMANTIC VOUTH, a story of Carrbridge University life, published in 1933. Young love is the theme of both.

Seemingly, A Very Gallant Gentleman had a lasting effact on me:

Came the war. In 1916 Pentelow was appointed to the editorial chair of The Maqnet and The Gem. He also contributed many stories to these papers, the best known and most controversial being 'A Very Gallant Gentleman'

I am fascinated by those edinorials in whioh iffspelt and sbusive forters fram roadore land othervfl were pubriahed. However, I dan't think it would be quite fair to lay wh the blowne on H. A. Hinton, oven though this pollcy commenced under his rule. I.N. Psnrelow wrote oditorisis both before and after he took over Hinton's chair, and abusive ferters weve fegruned frequently in IWP's chata.
You will agree that it dbes not foulow that a controiling editor, slithough rasponaibio for aditorialt and the wews expressed therein, acrualty wirss thern himsell. I have noticed' that "the firm confiolegt signsturs, YOUR EDITOR" was certsinl'y und under Alip odimorials ffor classic examples see Gem 494-ai), and Pontelow also wrote under that pienwe of the sotion or his den foee Gem 612, 616, 538-9).
The bhunt (end ofton cruel) replies to readers: the cancuitod suif-importance; the morailzing: the ponderpusty sarious outiook, all fit in with the lmage of JVP as givion by hivs stories.
Apart from bis unique atyle, Pentelow has his special vocybulary by which he can be recognizad inmedrately. Chief smang the latter is his obssasion with the word' "hotion"t. Nobody ever had an ides in a Pantelow story - it is alvays a notion, and s, nord that the averuge author may not heve cavas to use in months is strown cansistently whe a trademsok throuph averything that JWP writes. In studying scares of Pisntolow stories / hove ver to find and in which the ward "notion" fails to appasc: it is used not anly in full-length staries, but in every short instahnent of woply smialy sach as "Gopgs". "Franklingham", "Lunck of the Garne", "Twins from Tasmania", and in short stories in the "Popuciar". It avw appears fraquant/y in short editovishls. fastuves, and in the "Girgytriars GaMery". Examples from . .NP editarialt are: "A very folly fittie notion....", "..... give you some sort of notion ...."." ""..... thi's notioo" etc., ett.

## A STUD Y OF SUBSTITUTION by Laurie Sutton

It requires a painfut afforz to read throigh many of Pentelow's subst/tuto stories - just wards, wards, words, with plots either non-existent or so tangled ipp that 1, ut hesit, give up trying to wark out what it's all about
 lang, long hand-backs. Even so Ais styie was about fifty yoars out of dato oven st the time when he was writing. I haw remarked before on his obsessian with the wovd "notion", snd how every ane of his stories comtains its quora of from haif a-dozon to it ztore. These things ave spotlighted by studying the stovins and taking out thoosands of phrapes as I here clorie it fecent years. But it is fabanious wark - particuianly it Pentelow's case when it is literally ao effort to get through somie of the stories:

## PENTELOW'S SCHOOL STORIES bV Gerry Allison

Mor exaryone will agree with Laurie Sutton's opinion of Panteliow as a writer, or with his statement in the March "Collectors' Digest", that "actually, WP was quite out of his depth in writing for a whokiy paper"-
I wonder if Laurie has ewer hoord of the wekly paper PLUCK; or rand the superb stories about Wycliffe and Haysur th sctoods, which, commencing in fonuary 1907, ran for many years therein.
They vere leter reparinted practicaily complenaly in some thirty odd copvies of the BOVS' FRIEND LIBRARY which is whare I first read them. These copies of the B.F.L. arg now among the most treasured items in ay collection of old boys' books. That $/ \mathrm{dm}$ not atone in my estimate of Pentelow, the two following extracts will show.

Nothing too far fetched in thesw yarns, just enough of that liftie bit of extra to make a good plot. Such stovies were those written by that very versatile suthor John Nix Pontelow ...... I Chink he ercelfod with hit schoof stories"

## THE PENTELOW CONTROVERSY by Laurie Sutton

In his defence of J. N. Ponmelow Gorry Aftmon quovas a couple of others who share his admiration for that author, but he must be well aware that he could have found planty of evidence of collectors hotiling contrary views.
Gery is as entided to his opinion as $/$ amn to mine - which happens to be that Pentelow was the biggesr bove who ever put pen to pasper. Yes, I have road - or, fathor, atzompted' ro resd' - Pentolow's Wycliffe and Haygarth stories; but / found them as great an effort as his Grayfriars and St Jim's tales, pod as habourod as "The Fourth Form at Franklingham", "Twins From Twamanis", "Goggs - Grammarian" tote wonden boy who cound do anything you ceved to name to an absolute peat of pertectionl)
1 ofren wonder if sonte of the ohder collectors who profess admiration for Pentelow's veritigg have not allowned youthful nostalgis to clowd their aduit judgement. lafso have treaswed books that I read as a yourgegter, but Idon't actuaily rood' them now, and I certain/y couidn't read them dsily as I do Greytriars ar St. Whi's. Even with Charles Raminton's wank, I reallae that my boyncod heroes, Lumley-Lumley and Tabbot, are greatly inferior to dozens of other characters.
The fact, 38 I see it, was that Pentovow iscked the facile ability to twon out shorr weakfy storias. His plots are invariably bcaged down in a colossal amount of paodfing. which uncially cakes the form of deadly duil diatogue, of hen used as a means of showing off Peotelow's clever dick reparter, which, placed in the mouths of hoys between twelve and fiftoen voors of age is just roo ridicilouns.
In ane of the articles from whict Gerry quates, memtion is made of Pentelow's sparting knowfedge - "He knew his subjecr, be /t cricket, foorer, boxing, or athierics". Sinos peopre ave fand of criticising Charies Haminton for Als sporting descriptions (the latest on the cover of "Floreat Greytriars") /t is interesting to note that Pentelow was also, in fact, wry hazy about aocoer, as the following extracts from his "Victims and Vittors", Magulet 464, conchanively prove:
"... as Delarey jumped to fist it out, the big man charged him, ball and all, into the net." This would have bean a foul on the goaiknoor, who cannot be chargod while his feet ave off the ground, and apart from that it shows ignorance of the game. If the keeper was attempting to fist the ball it would newer be in his pospession: he would either miss it, when it would go straight into the net, or he would make contact, when it would go back uppield.
"The goakkepor got his fingors to is; Dut Wharton gor his showdid agoinst the goakeoper's chest in the same secolod, and the ball dropped into the net." Another fout, and revealing ignorance of the game. If the kecper anly got his fingers to the ball he would not he in possession and thevelove could not leyally be charged; and in any case it is not permitted to charge a goatie (or anyone else) in the chese.
"Courteney put in a regular puie-driver, and the goakeepper gor a number gieven boor to it". Here we haw the same error that C.H. is oftent taulted forl' No goalkeeper ever puts his boot to a shot - much less a pile. drivert If he trind it the holl wothd aimost certainly spin off into the net.
It would soem that if ang can accept Ponrslow's other trories one cin sfomsch his Greyfriers and St. Jim's tales. I cannot pnetend to do either. My discussions and correspondence suggest that mast colioctors agneg with me.

## ROGER JENKINS:

There can be ao doubt that Hamitton was bittenly incensod about Pantralow all his Whe, despite the fact that other editars publisted substitute rtories, apart from Pentelow. Theve undoubtedly must have been something adolitional abdut Penteiow to causo such bittamess.
When Charfes Homilton was writing his autobiography, he intended to follow the advice of Hotspur in "Heliry IV" end tell the truch to ahame the devi. There was a chapter on JNP written, which was giving offence to any ralatives Pentelow might have left, and partly to kesp the rove of the aurobiography mollow and servene, the offending chapters on Pentelow were transferred to the famous "Tockod drawer" and Charies Hamition declared that some people seemed mare interested in the chapters left out then thass left in? What happened to the chapter in the locked dravepr is a mystory, but presumbtiy it wis clostroy rad.
When I wrote an articte on the Grovtriars Story Comperition fwhich appeored in the Mapnet during Hinton's regimel Charles Hemitton wro te to me to declare that he was centain that Hinton was not responsible, but that he was the victim of more astute rogues (wiz. Pentelow). Every additionsl piect of information about the Hamilton-fentefow Juarrel makes it seem more and more ioteresting. but I feel we shafl now have to rest content with tantailsing glimpses.

## PETER HANGER:

The evidence that Ponzollow hold back gonuine zorios in fawor of his own craations is quite indisputable. For witness how "A Very Gallant Genternan" intrudes into the First Redwirg series. While Hamitton was craating worthwhale characters, Pentalow wat deatroying them. Have you naticed that "A Very Ginlant Gentleman" was No. 520 ? Surely the mant wes not concerited onough to regard this as a spocist story to colobrats ten years of the Magner.

## BILL GANDER:

It is surporising how opinions vary regaroling J.N. Pencellow's sbiwty as a story writer - spart from his venturne into Havilton sub writing. It soms that one aither hikes him a grat chasl, or elae disilkes him a sveat deal. Here is something I do not temember ever having seen refevence made to - the case of Gem \$57 "All The Wirners", and Gem 458 " 71 The Seasts of the Mighty". The first wnitten by Charles Herniteon, the second by I. N. Pentelow. Does this indicate co-operation, or could J.N.P. hare discarded C.H's stary and written one himseff for the 1916 Christmas Number?

## THAT MAN PENTELOW by Eric Fayne

Next fo Hamuton and Brooks, probobly no man has foatured mora in Coliactors' Digost columns down the vears than John Nix Pentelow. Though, unlike them, he has usually collecred more kicks than hajoence.
I think it hikely that Hamilranians have done him less then justice and' I myself am no less guilty in that diroctran than amyone else. Prejudices -especiolly those from youth -die havd!
Another point is that he koved the Haminon schools and characters. He must hove done, otherwise he could not have written the Greyfriars and' St. Jim's Gallevies which gave proof of constant and aflectionste reading of Horwitronia. th has been suggested that he evwi trited to "tako over" the writing of the Hawilton papers. I can see no proof of thir stter a hard study of the Pentellow period. Legend' has it that Hamilron aned Pontelow had a blazing row aver something or other. I can find nothing to indicate that either. All the ewiderice, from Perstelow's period of edictoship, is thar he and Haniften wore working together in harmony. Pentalow's editorship ended, so far as Hamittonia mas concerned, in early 1919. Any disagreement that Hamilton had with Peritelow alter that date cart hardly have aflectad the sugply of Hamilron stories to the Companian Papers. It was long after Pentelow's edirorship ended thot the real gitut of substitute stories hit the Gevn and the Magnet.
fiecentiy, Pentelow has been mildily criticised as ructe to mythical roaders, in his effitorlabs. In fact, that trait was far more evident with Hinron than it was with Pentelow, who had less apoce to spresd himself during the yoars of the war. Indoed it was Pontelow who, over many weeks, devored most of his editovial sovce to brief histories of both the Gem and the Magnet, and publistied a complete list of zfoyy tifles to date, in both popers. This gesture mist heve been keenly apponclaned by reviders, and was proof of a pleassint and whimsical sentimentality on the part of the editor.

John Nix Pentelow was born at Somentham. Sains Ives. Huntingdon, on the 26th March 1872. He was one of a family of eight children lfive boys and throe girlst His father being Ebeneozer Pentelow who kept a local grocer and drapers shop. His unusual sacond christion name of Nix corming from his mother's maiden name Matilids Fischel Augusts Nix, daughter of a local landowner of Somustam Fon, The Penselows all originsted from the Parish of Pentelow, near Clare in Essex.
J.N.P. as a boy took a deep interest in writing, and cricket, though his game nover rosu above club level, At the early age of 14 he was witing stories, and hawing them socepted by Guy Payrate the publishers. Most of his early work wis anonymocs, but an asrly effect can be seen in Guy Roynars Pooket Novels 'The Track of the Cloven Hoof' (1099) publ ished under his name.

Apert from writing, he alsp became a skholmaseer at a prammer school in Huntingsonshife for pe short time, followed as an officer in the Customs and oxcise, bot he abo gane this ue to bsoomes a full time writer and editor.
Cricker wats without guestion his favourite sport, and he hid an almost mania for the game, and all its history. A prolific contributor to the papeer 'Oricket' ha beceme its aditor and proprietor in January 1912. Unfortunately this papar was noc a sacpesstul wenture to the world of firance - and became uran worse whian the great A.G. Mackaren joined him as partsai, Macl, men of England and Lancashire was unreliable in the buainass iance and although they chargod the title to The Worlid of Gricket, this within a year finslly closed. Penvelowr setened tated in life to stwers be dogged with ilffortune, and encountur difficultiks. The coming of the Great War brought a hatt to first class crictort, and so he dowomd his full time to writing boys fiction. He had written for nearly all the Harmsworth boys papors with grat distinction, 'Jack North', Naw first two initials of his name bering one pen-name, whilst another was Harry Huntingdon. The former isually coninected with his Whclitte cricest yarns which abpeared in Plock. He elso had contritastod to the Sceut, A porsonal triend of P,S, Warren Bell, who was editor of THE CAPTAN, a sort of very high school Bovs Cwm Pager, he had also cantributed mary stories and artickes under his onm name to his psper.
In 1916 te joined the Amalgamatad Press, when with his knowledge of writing school stonies, plus his editorial experience, he was invited to sesume control wer The Magnet \& Gern, shool spory popers, Both C.M, Down and H,A. Hinton had been called to the colours - and with the third in command G,R, Sarmwers fikely to go anytime on war servios thers was nobody loft to run the papers. It should be explained that both the Magnet $\&$ Gem Fod full iength school stories each week. The former tales of Grayfriars by 'Frank Richard', and the latter, stories of St, Jim's by "Martin Clitford'. Buth these suthars boing the sime person - Charles Hamiltori, and it could ber said that the contineed run of the paper sepended solely on this author: LN.P. immedistely took ouer his precthcassors warries, in the lack of oopy arriving from Cherles Harnilton on time - and more often or nol, rane coming st al. Tim previbus editors had overcome thin difficulty to some extont by usion mubstitutn writersbut for I N. P. this wis nat aliwavs possible -
for moet of twen were saway serving in the armad forces. His own soletion to this, wad aimply to write most of the starios Nimselt, and which he did. his first beirn in 1916 and his last actually lomg after he ceased to be editor in 1924. There does not seem ary foundstion to an allegstion once trade that J.N.P. irserted his oan storiss in prefarence to thicee of Chartes Hamilton - is the rtock book records for that period are completely bare, nor any truth that the sales of the Mognet and Gem dropped becaize of his tales. In faet the circulstions actually rose duting his period of office and the bavs of the period were ssemingly quite content with the yarns, for whom the rarket wes after al) intended. Undoubtsoly his best contribution was a sort of Greyfriars and St. Jim's. Who's Wha', in which he detailed accurately all the charscten! of the schools, and which has buen praised by his most out-spoken critics. He also created his own chard icter of PIET DELAREY - a South African boy in the remove. Probably the grostest controversy of his aditorship could be his 'killing off of Courtney it boy in the Grestriars Sixth, in a story entitied 'A Very Gallant Gentioman' which seems at first sight an act of class stupidity. But it hes been revealed in recent yesrs that fis from being a thoughtles act, J.N.P. was instructed to do so by a Higher suthority. Peaders were writing to the Magnet office complaining that they were gelting ponifused between Courtney of the Sixth and Fronk Courtenay Captain of the Fourth Form at Hishcliffe, The J.N.P. editorship of the Magnet 8 Gen, could be summed up peribctly by a former Diractor of the Firm who wrote as follows . . . . "I am astonished that there should be any onticism of Pantelaw diuring his poriod of oftice on The Magret and Gem, In my opinion, andes hesid of the osepartment, I think he did a marvellous job, with all socis of war-time diftioultics, He kept the papers gaing, when we might well have felt just fiod in sus: pending them, and who krows thry may not hawn been revived. I wander if alt thoas present day onthusiasts, and egoecially thoae who bought the papers in the 208 and 308 realise what dotit they owe to him Pentoion was a tirst class editor, and a man higily regarded by all in Fleatwey House.
With the return of H-A Hinton after the war, J,N,P, zesumed the editorship of The Marvel/Boys Fedin/ and several small fibraries, and wrote serisls and articles under the nemes of John Weet, Pichard Fiandolph and Randalph Fiyle. He aloo woitre buted cricket articke for all the other A.P. pepers including All Soorts edited by Arthur S. Hasdy. Many of his personas Triends were England and County Cricketers and quite of teen tack Hobbr and Herbert Strudwick coold be soen meking their wey to his room at Fleetwiry House.
It wis in the Marael thet he produond semeral supplerremts un tricket inchudingon 88 sogo supplement 'Who's Whes in the Cribked Woeld', In 1022 the Marvel was replaced by a much poomer publication entitled Sporl and Advenfure - which after only half o year cherged into Pluck. Tirod of editorial work, I.N.P. in 1924 tedided to go trielancing and so he retired from the Amalgemsied Press. He had always been desily respeceed it Flestway Hotise, where te was remorded something akin to Or . Locke the Headmestor of Grevfriars, lirm, a farthorty figure, kinoly, and a perfect gentleman. Hewas presented with a handsome silver cignrette box by nearly all of hil callouges.

Being a heaw smoker, it was a most suitable gift, and it toak prids of place beside his typewriter on his writing desk ar home.
As a freelance, JN.P. poured out stories for all sorts of publications including those far girls Under the narne of Madge Narth (Madge being the name of his second witg whom the marrisd in 1922 - his first howing didd at Hastings in 1921 agsd only 4 B ) whist he contributed to sporting and evering rewspapers, 33 well $\approx$ to Lillywhite's Annua//Wisdon/The Cficketer! and Ayris Cricket Companion. (Which he edited for a few yeers till his death). One honour that came hil wey, and which probably is unique in boys fiction history. was thet one of his storios was actusily reviewned in the Obeerver - by I.C. Sguire (1ster Sir) the temous book critic, And the incident was related to te by H,W. Twyman former editor of the Union Jock who was at Godalming Station with Squire at the time, and awaiting the troin to London. With nothing to read, his owe hid been cought by the pricket soene on the pover of a Bays Friand Libeary. He resd it, and wrote over 1500 words on the took, in his review.

J,N.P. hirreelf was a tall, woll built, good-fooking man, who alweys looked older then his years. Distinguished in appesianos and approsch, he tsked in a very quiet soice, end wos unfurtunatoly aftlicted with deasfnoss, which mide a long conversation at tirres an ordeal, He was an ond book collector, and his home at 'Kintemito' Woodmansterne Fload, Cashalton, where he had maved for his heofth in 1929 wos stacked but with books at all descriptions. An avid raader, he was rarely seen without several books under his arm, Jack London was one of his tavourites, followed by Zane Grey and Clarence Mulford creator of Hopelang Cestick. He also had at one time almost a com plete file of Magnets and Germs - Itill just betore his death) and was a great admirar of Charles Hamiten's whools - Gordon Gey of Aycombe Grammar School being a special famourite of his
dN.P. could also be sid to be an Old Eoys Book Callecter, os in 1931, he alio wrote an article about the OH Bincods. H is health dectined sharply in the early part of 1931, and he died in the early morning of Sundey July 5 th at the ago of 50 , Ironically mough it was alto bis wife's hirthday she incidentally being related to Svd Prito the Union Jadk artist. An obituary notice uppared in The Times - and cributes poured in from al quarters, and his deeth to the warld of aricket writing whe sadly to be missod.
J.N.F. could be soid to have become farnous in two westify different fieids of litersiure - only probably tqualled by Edgar Wallace. The first in cribkot statistics he had no scuast, and was regarded as one of the greatest authorities of all tirre, and his boaks/articlos on the subject mary one dey be mand into a biblicgreptry. The socond in puantile literature, his stocies teaturing Wychiffe and Haw* garsh ectiools are regarded as classics of their kind, authentic without being dull and so true to life, He also had the distinction of editing two of the most leved and widaly collected boys papers of all time The Magnet a Gam.
H.W. Twyman said of J.N.P. "He was one of that rare breed of men, that orne ususily onty reads about, and one whom one wished he cepld be. Ottien er not, he acosptad storias from contributors that wore well below standird, simply becsuse the writer probsoly needed tha monsy. He had a heart of gold" John W. Wheway whom I met ar Fleetway House, expressed the vow that 'perheps the worse thing that werer pould be said about J.N.P. was that he was overicaded with gocd naturet. 1.R. Samweys, who worked with him on the Magnet and Gem as sub editor sald 'of his inherent goodness there can be no doubt.

Although L.N.P. was bom o hundrad yeari ago his memory lingers on, and he thas made \& niche for himself to all time in the reatres of toys Fiction.
